




Primary vs Secondary


4 important facts about parental engagement:

Outside of School

Establish Routines


Parents play a significant role in helping their children to establish good study routines:

- Encouraging the completion of Homework;
- Helping them be organised for each day at school – correct books, equipment, PE kit;
- Getting to school on time;
- Encouraging good attendance.

Communication with school

- Mrs Waring and the Inclusion Team will aim to answer emails within 48 hours. Due to demand on services, this maybe longer.


Supporting and Developing Literacy

- Encourage your child to read at home for pleasure. This is particularly important this summer.
- Encourage the use of **Reading Plus** which is an accelerated reading programme.
- GCSE Examinations have a reading age of **15 years 7** months.
- We have students in current Year 9 with reading ages as low as 9 years.

What is it like to be fourteen and unable to read properly?

At primary school children are taught to read. At secondary school, children read to learn.

The gift of a good, high quality read...



A reading age of 11+ so the content is **interesting** and will **challenge**;

Five chapters a week = 10 minutes of reading a day.

Most students have started the novel in their *Move Up* day in English so are already on their way...

Teaching behaviour

- 'Behave' means lots of things. Students/ staff / parents are not all the same.
- They have enormous differences in behavioural skills, habits, beliefs. *E.G attitudes towards vaping.*
- To help students succeed, we need to TEACH the behaviors they need to perform in our setting.
- And sometimes, children just have to learn to follow simple instructions.

Classroom Prompts - Explicit Reminders of the key Learning Behaviours we need to see.





Punctuality and Punctuality Detentions

- If a child is late for school or a lesson, they are given a 30-minute detention on either Wednesday, Thursday or Friday.
- Morning Line Ups Students need to be in their Lines by 8:35.

Why do we do this?

- Punctuality is a life skill.
- Line Ups provide a calm and structured start to the day.
- It helps us to manage the movement around school and ensure a calm and safe environment.
- Students who are late for lesson without good reason are often avoiding lessons. We are failing them if we let them get away with this.

The School Day

- Start to Line Up 8:32. Line Ups close at 8:35.
- Registration and Form Time: 8.35am-9.00am
- **Period 1:** 9.00-10.00
- **Period 2:** 10.00-11.00
- **BREAK:** 11.00-11.20
- **Period 3:** 11.20-12.20
- **Period 4:** 12.20-1.20
- LUNCH: 1.20-2.00
- **Period 5:** 2.00-3.00

The cumulative effect of poor punctuality

- 5 minutes a lesson = 25 minutes a day = 2 hours per week = 5 to 7 days per term
- = Between 15 to 20 hours a year

Exit Routines and Keep to the Left

Exit Routine



- 1. When you are told by your teacher, pack up all equipment and stand quietly. Chairs should be placed under the desk.
- 2. The room needs to be left tidy.
- 3. Teacher: Good Morning/Good Afternoon and Thank-You Year X. Class: Good Morning/Good Afternoon and Thank-You Mr/Mrs/Miss/Ms X.
- 4. The teacher will supervise the exit from the room. The class will be dismissed row-by-row.
- 5. Leave the room in an orderly and sensible manner.
- 6. Remember your manners STEPS.
- 7. Move around the school site sensibly and purposefully.

8. If you receive a late mark during the school day, you will automatically receive a 30-minute detention on either Monday, Wednesday or Friday. If you fail to show, it will be a 60-minute detention.

Strict Mobile Phone Policy

- Phones need to be switched off and kept out of sight during the school day. This includes breaks and lunchtimes.
- If a phone is seen or heard, phones will be confiscated until the end of the week. A parent can come and collect the phone. If you have to do this, we ask that you follow up with a consequence at home. Otherwise, what does your child learn?

Why do we do this?

- Phones are a significant distraction in a school setting.
- This prevents major safeguarding incidents.
- This encourages students to talk to each other.



As a general rule students are not allowed out of lessons to go to the toilet

We have this in place to minimise anti-social behaviour, lesson avoidance and issues around punctuality.

We do issue toilet passes for students with genuine medical reasons and staff use common sense and judgment in lessons if children need to use the toilet.

High standards of uniform and personal appearance

- Encourages pride in the school.
- Value for money.
- A social leveller.
- Helps to create a calm, business like environment conducive to good learning.
- From September 2025, <u>trousers for all</u> to protect the modesty of our students and safeguarding issues.

Students with additional needs

We provide extensive support for children with additional needs; however, this is done within the context of a mainstream setting. This means:

- 1. Additional needs are not an excuse for poor behaviour. **We fail students when we do not impose a consequence for poor behaviour.** We will always make reasonable adjustments so that students can meet our high expectations.
- 2. We build resilience. Coming to a mainstream high school means making new friends and grappling with a multitude of new and challenging subjects. We fail students when we allow them to opt out. Children are expected to be in all lessons. Time in the Inclusion Centre is limited to certain times and/or to access specific services.
- **3.** The best place for any student is in a classroom with a qualified teacher. Our staff are continually trained on how best to support children with specific needs.
- 4. Part- Time timetables are not in the best interests of children. They are used sparingly and in exceptional circumstances.
- **5.** Your child will not necessarily have a Teaching Assistant. For those children with SEND, our aim is to reduce support over time and to build independence and resilience.

What happens when you disagree with school?

Don't be that parent

- If your child is late they have a detention.
- If they've not done homework there will be a consequence.
- If your child is rude, uncooperative and disrupts the learning of others— there will be a consequence.

Otherwise, what are you teaching them?


Parental Code of Conduct






